He emphasized on the importance of IQAC in a University and believed that suggestions obtained through such meetings can help the university in achieving excellence in higher education.

Thereafter the agenda items were taken up one by one:

ITEM I TO CONSIDER AND APPROVE THE MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING HELD ON 02 NOVEMBER 2019

The Minutes of the last meeting of Internal Quality Assurance Cell held on 2 November 2019 were read out by Dr. Payal Mehtani, Coordinator-IQAC, and the members accorded their unanimous approval for the same. (**Annexure I**)

ITEM II TO CONSIDER AND APPROVE THE ACTION TAKEN REPORT OF THE LAST MEETING HELD ON 02 NOVEMBER 2019

The Coordinator-IQAC presented the report of the follow up action taken by the University on the decisions of the IQAC in its meeting held on 2 November 2019.

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After detailed deliberations the action taken report was approved by the members. Dr. Ashok Gupta suggested that a report of the activity data collected through Google form should be compiled by Chronicler Committee and reviewed by IQAC quarterly and a notice of the same should be circulated in advance so that the faculty members can fill in the form at their pace.

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In response to an enquiry made by Prof. K. S Sharma about the need to repeat the training of filling up of Google form, Chairperson, Dr. Ashok Gupta suggested that it should be done twice in a year and also the form should be improved regularly as per the suggestions obtained from the faculty members.

ITEM III TO REPORT REGARDING PREPARATION AND COMPILATION OF AQAR FOR THE SESSIONS 2017-18 AND 2018-19

IQAC Coordinator, Dr. Payal Mehtani informed the members that as per recommendation of the NAAC, IQAC prepares the Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) after completion of each session. The AQAR for session 2017-18 was prepared and after its approval by the Board of Management, it has been submitted to NAAC-UGC, on 29 December. 2018 (Annexure II-Available at: https://iisuniv.ac.in/sites/research/files/rep/AQAR%20IISU%2017-18.pdf). An acknowledgement mail for the same was received from Central Application Processing Unit (CAPU-AQAR) on 10 January, 2019 (Annexure III). The AQAR (2017-18) has also been uploaded on the University website, for perusal of the faculty and students.

Further, a committee for the compilation of AQAR (2018-19) has been constituted and members are working on the same (**Annexure IV**).

The members appreciated the efforts of IQAC in this regard.

b) TO SHARE THE ANNUAL REPORT OF 2017-18 OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Annual Report of the University (2017-18) was compiled by the Annual Report Committee and submitted to IQAC. This was further uploaded on the University website.

The highlights of the annual report are:

- 236 departmental activities that included guest lectures/seminars/industrial visits/workshops etc. were organized
- 9 national workshops/conferences/seminars and an HR conclave
- Details of faculty and student research projects granted in were reported that included 2 major faculty research projects granted by DST and DBT, New Delhi.
- Number of research publications, papers presented in national/international conferences, national and international collaborations, consultancy, campus placements, internships, extension activities.

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- Major cultural events organized
- Details of student and faculty achievers and activities organized by various cells of the university
- Result analysis for the session 2017-18

The members were further informed about the progress of compilation of Annual Report of 2018-19 of the University. The members were requested to provide their suggestions for further improvement of the same. Mr. Rahul Kumar suggested that the placement information should be given in detail in the report. Prof. K.S. Sharma suggested that if the annual report can be printed and sent across various universities, it may help in increasing perception of the university. Dr. Ashok Gupta advised that the report should be compiled in such a way that it produces a document that is readable and comprehendible. Moreover, it should include pictures of better quality. He added that the report compiled with these specifications can be printed and sent to different universities.

ITEM VI CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMITTEE FOR THE PREPARATION OF SSR FOR THE CYCLE II OF NAAC VISIT

It was informed to the members that the first cycle of NAAC Accreditation of the University was done in the year 2014 which was valid till May 2019. As such, the preparation for the 2nd cycle of the NAAC accreditation has been taken up. The Hon'ble Vice Chancellor has constituted a committee under the Coordinatorship of Prof. Roopa Mathur to prepare the S.S.R. and the committee has started working on it (**Annexure VI**).

The members noted the same.

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ITEM VII TO REPORT REGARDING PARTICIPATION IN NIRF RANKING 2019

The Coordinator-IQAC, Dr. Mehtani informed the members about submission of institutional data on 6 December, 2018 on the NIRF portal for National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) Ranking 2019 (Annexure VII-Available at: https://iisuniv.ac.in/sites/research/files/rep/AQAR%20IISU%2017-18.pdf). She also explained the scoring pattern of the ranking obtained for IIS (Deemed to be University) which is based on five parameters namely, Teaching Learning and Resources (TLR), Research and Professional Practice (RP), Graduation Outcomes (GO), Outreach and Inclusivity (OI), and Perception (PR). Suggestions were invited for improvement upon the various parameters. The following suggestions were received:

- Dr. Raakhi Gupta suggested that the Research Promotion Committee should be advised to prepare and circulate a list of Scopus approved journals for each department.
- She also suggested that though the university circulates the information regarding research proposals invited by different external funding agencies, but the system can be further strengthened.
- Prof. Pradeep Bhatnagar suggested that collaborative research should be promoted.
- Prof. Pradeep Bhatnagar further suggested that there should be a separate fund allocated to research scholars for outsourcing of high-end instrumentation not available in the university. Prof. K.S. Sharma suggested that a policy for the same can be framed so that students of different departments outsourcing various facilities for testing of their samples could be benefitted. Prof. Roopa Mathur added that

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formation of an Endowment Committee can help to strengthen resource for research mobilization.

- Prof. Roopa Mathur also recommended organization of a FDP/Training workshop on 'How to write and apply research projects to external funding agencies?'
- She further suggested that incentives can be given to faculty members for distinctive achievements in research.
- Shri Mahendra Surana suggested that efforts should be made to get industry projects. Prof. Roopa Mathur suggested that industry academia interaction should be strengthened for the same. Prof. Raakhi Gupta informed the members that CONNECT of the university is now active and working on the same.
- Shri Surana further suggested that the score in Peer Perception can be increased by strengthening the human resources like, internationally recognized experts of different subjects especially some Nobel Laureates can be invited to deliver series of talks in different areas of knowledge. Prof. Roopa Mathur added that interactions with national and international experts can be organized through Skype. Moreover, individual departments can search LinkedIn for experts in their respective subjects.

ITEM VIII TO SHARE THE REPORTS OF THE FEEDBACK MONITORING COMMITTEE

Coordinator IQAC, Dr. Mehtani briefed the members about the collection of various feedbacks by the Feedback Monitoring Committee round the year and also shared the proformas of the same with the members (**Annexure VIII (a-g)**).

She also informed the members that the following feedbacks were collected and analysed for the session 2018-19 till date while

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preparation of reports for the other types of feedback was in process:

- Syllabus Completion Feedback

The highlights of the feedbacks are:

 Syllabus Completion Feedback- All the 18 departments of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences; 8 Departments of the Faculty of Commerce and Management and 11 Departments of the Faculty of Science had completed their respective syllabus in the given duration of time and some of the departments had taken extra classes to complete their CA syllabus on time.

 Curricular Feedback- Students feel that most of the courses of the university are job oriented and interesting. Some suggestions for improvements in curricula received are:

- Updated Tally software in Accounting and Taxation
- > Addition of more software in Mathematics
- Organization of more industrial/field visits, workshops/demonstrations/seminars/Guest Lectures in some of the departments
- Organization of career counseling sessions
- Some students feel that assignments and activities should be reduced
- More interactive sessions on listening and speaking practices in German and French.
- More Library sessions were suggested by students of Home Science/Food & Nutrition.
- More practical in the curriculum of Computer Science & IT, Accounting and Taxation, HRM & IB and Tourism Management.

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- More usage of new teaching learning aid in Accounting and Taxation.
- Introduction of Stock market related more subjects in Financial Studies.
- Inclusion of Basic computer application course in HRM & IB.
- > MBA in Marketing and Finance should be started.
- Addition of more practical papers on Illustrations in Fashion Designing and Textile
- More visits to Parliament and State Legislature in Political Science.
- > More focus on Indian Writing in English

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Inclusion of African and Canadian Literature as well as cultural theories in English.

 Faculty Feedback- Online faculty feedback taken from the students of different classes and programs was analysed and shared with the respective faculty members for self correction.

The members noted and unanimously approved the same. It was suggested that on the basis of feedbacks, appropriate action should be taken wherever required.

ITEM XIII ANY OTHER ITEMS WITH THE PERMISSION OF THE CHAIR

Coordinator-IQAC apprised the members about the system of identification of slow and advanced learners in the class. Further, suggestions were invited for improving learning among slow learners and efforts that can be put in to facilitate learning outcomes of fast learners.

Suggestions were received to improve the system of remedial classes for slow learners. Also, Shri Mahendra Surana suggested that teachers should find ways to make teaching interesting for slow learners. He added that soft skills of advanced learners can be improved upon to facilitate them in getting good placements.

The Student member – Ms. Yashita Sharma suggested that management students should be encouraged to organize some events by themselves in the university. In addition to the same, Dr. Raakhi Gupta suggested that management students can give a proposal of organization of an event/activity to the head of their

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department which can be further submitted for approval to the management, of the University.

Ms. Sharma added that improvement in the mindset of the management students is required in terms of professionalism.

- The advantages of using a Google format were discussed that included the ease of filling the form using a computer or a mobile and the data is filled can be extracted in an excel format.
- The following suggestions were received:
 - Guidelines should be framed and should be circulated to all departments for filling information in the format.
 - Standard font type, size, image resolution and number etc. should be provided as a template.
 - 10th of every month should be the last date to fill data in the format for the previous month.
 - Dr. Raakhi Gupta emphasized that the format once filled and submitted should not be editable for corrections. Any sort of editing/ updating should be made by admin, only after receiving a written permission from an authorized member.
 - It was informed that the Google output is not page savvy and if a printout is taken for maintaining records then it would be too bulky. To avoid this problem, Prof. Nisha Yadav suggested that after submission of the data by respective departments/cells, the excel report can be shared with all the departments and print out of the same can be maintained in the departmental records.
 - Dr. Priyanka Mathur raised the query about the save option in the Google format. It was explained that the features given by Google form can only be used and cannot be customized as per requirements and hence save option is not available in the Google format.
 - It was suggested to organize a meeting with the Heads of various departments and Coordinators of guilds to brief them about Google Activity form.

The university organized several activities for the purpose of Environmental awareness and protection in the session. Some of these are:

- The Department of Environmental and Life Sciences conducts research on various topics related to Environmental Conservation to further promote environmental consciousness among community at large through publications, paper presentations, Guest lectures etc. Some of the lectures organized by the Department were on Light Pollution, Marine Life and application of Environmental Sciences in environmental conservation. The lectures were delivered by prominent scientists in the field of Environmental Science
- The Department of Environment & Life Sciences organizes a good number of conferences on Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation to further promote the idea of environmental consciousness. The Eco-friendly Association of the University organized demonstration cum Training Workshop on "Recycling of waste paper and handmade paper making was organized on 10/08/2017 in collaboration with Kumarappa National Handmade Paper Institute (KNHPI), Sanganer, Jaipur, to promote the concept of 'Waste to Wealth'.
- The University has its first step towards developing a small Medicinal garden. Its objective is to maintain a conservatory of important species of Medicinal and Aromatic plants.
- The University harnesses the available potential for generating solar power by using unutilized space at its roof- top to promote green and clean power by installing a 75 KWp Grid interactive SPV power plant to reduce the dependence on conventional energy sources.
- The IIS University has a green campus which has been further enhanced by declaring the campus

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a "No Tobacco Zone".

- In its initiative to save energy the University has started replacing the conventional tube lights with LED tube lights in a phased manner.
- Staff and students are encouraged to switch off the electrical appliances when they are not in use.
- Efforts are being made for carbon neutrality on the campus. The hostel kitchen uses the gas burners for cooking. Use of coal/ wood/ kerosene etc is strictly prohibited.
- The University encourages the campus community to use University buses for transportation, thus saving fuel and reduce the carbon emissions.
- Staff as well as the students are encouraged to organize car pools for commuting.
- The residual water from the RO systems is used to water the University lawns.
- The water from the air conditioners' and distillation unit outlets is collected in a tank and is used for laboratory purposes.
- A contract has been signed with a waste management company for recycling of used answer sheets and discarded practical files.
- The University has signed a contractual agreement with Instromedix (India) Pvt. Ltd. for collection, treatment and disposal of biomedical waste generated in the University Campus. The firm has been selected as the "Boot Operator" by Rajasthan State Pollution Control Board for The IIS University.
- Tree plantation drives are undertaken time to time in the University campus and surrounding areas to sensitize the students about the benefits of planting trees.
- The water quality of bore well water and water cooler at the campus is regularly monitored for various quality parameters including pH, electrical conductivity, total hardness, fluorides, nitrates and inorganic phosphates as well as microbiological parameters.
- At the University campus, the ambient and indoor air quality is regularly monitored. The Department of Environmental Science is actively involved in monitoring the indoor air quality with respect to respirable particulate matter, suspended particulate matter, SO₂ and NO₂ using a dust sampler.
